/////In 1949 a struggling American writer, Helene Hanff, hoping to indulge her love of beautiful books, started a correspondence with CHARING CROSS a firm of British antiquarian booksellers that was to last for 20 years. The warm, compassionate and very human exchange of letters was published as a book - 84 Charing Cross Road – and <u></u> ★has been masterfully adapted for the stage by James Roose-Evans. This acclaimed production sees the welcome return of

Mary Young to the directorial chair, and the skilled acting talents of Sue Shephard and John Hamilton in the lead roles, ably supported by many of our more experienced players.

The show opens on Friday 16 November and runs through to the following Saturday 24 November, with evening performances from 7.45pm and a matinee on Saturday 17 November at 2.30pm.



AUDITION NOTICE LADIES IN RETIREMENT by Edward Percy & Reginald Denham

We open the season with the above period thriller, based on a famous murder of the 1890's.

Leonora Fiske shares her lonely house on the Thames marshes with her companion and house keeper Ellen Creed. But when Ellen's two sisters come for a 'holiday', and their strange behaviour causes Leonora to ask them to leave, it is Leonora who vanishes. The action is also complicated by the arrival of the Creed sisters' nephew, Albert, adding to the mystery and suspense, as he attempts to trap the murderer.

CHARACTERS

Leonagra a retired ex-actress, not a star as we would understand it, but a jobbing

actress who now has to rely on financial favours from previous admirers to

survive.

Ellen the perfect housekeeper of the period, you would say at first glance, yet

this is a woman who spends the period of the action concealing a terrible secret, and gradually loses it as the play progresses. Like her two sisters, one suspects Ellen has a touch of the mental illness that they too suffer

from.

both these sisters have what we would now call special needs. The 1890's were not so kind and they would have been lucky to escape commitment to a lunatic asylum. This is not to say they are mad or insane in any way, but they both have the obsessive characteristics of

the mentally retarded.

The above four characters will have a playing age of middle to elderly age, say from late forties to seventies plus.

Lucy Gilham a twenty something maid. Flirty, cheeky, when with Albert, but very

respectful in the presence of the older women.

Sister Theresa Roman Catholic nun from nearby Convent, No Irish accent really

necessary, but one would be nice. Friend of Leonora and

consequently around her age, 50's to 70's.

Albert Feather The only male, except for a voice off. Albert is around Lucy's age,

cocky, an accent that is now described as Estuarine not cockney, perhaps Mockney. A jack-the-lad, quick on the uptake, a petty criminal already, but clever and cunning in the way of an Eastend

market boy.

All of the above roles give ample opportunity for the actors to create differing and colourful characters. I look forward to directing this play, which the Little Theatre did many years ago, but which I feel is more than good enough to repeat and be a success with Seaford audiences.
