pregnant, exhausted wife, Pattie, all come together to produce a funny and riotous comedy directed by Garry Fowler assisted by Clare Penfold,.



AUDITION NOTICE

TWELFTH NIGHT

by William Shakespeare, directed by David Parton

Audition Date: Monday 21 November 2022- 7.30pm

Seaford Little Theatre

Production dates: 9 - 17 June 2023

Viola and her twin brother Sebastian have been shipwrecked; each believes the other to be drowned. Viola disguises herself as a young man and, under the name of Cesario, gets a job as a servant for the Duke, Orsino.

A LOVE TRIANGLE Orsino is in love with Olivia, but she's mourning for her dead brother, so has rejected all his advances so far. He sends Cesario (who is really Viola) with love letters to woo Olivia on his behalf. Unfortunately for the Duke, Olivia is taken in by Cesario's disguise and falls in love with him. Viola has secretly fallen in love with Orsino, and Orsino is confused by his feelings for his new 'male' servant. So, Viola loves Orsino, Orsino loves Olivia and Olivia loves Cesario/Viola.

TRICKING MALVOLIO Olivia's butler, Malvolio, disapproves of all the other members of her household – her drunken uncle Sir Toby Belch, his friend Sir Andrew Aguecheek and her servants, Maria, Feste and Fabia. Fed up with Malvolio constantly spoiling their fun, they decide to play a practical joke on him. Malvolio is secretly in love with Olivia, and the others trick him into believing that these feelings are returned. Maria forges a letter to Malvolio, supposedly from Olivia, suggesting that she loves him and he should wear yellow stockings and smile all the time. Malvolio does as the letter suggests, and Olivia thinks he has gone mad, so has him locked up.

SEBASTIAN RETURNS Viola's brother, Sebastian, who believes his sister is dead, arrives with his friend and protector, Antonio, who rescued him from the shipwreck. Sebastian meets Olivia. She mistakes him for Cesario and asks him to marry her, he agrees.

CONFUSION, COUPLING AND A HAPPY ENDING Lots of confusion follows around the mistaken identity of Sebastian and Cesario, and exactly who is promised to whom. Eventually all is revealed, the brother and sister are reunited and the love triangle is resolved into two couples, Sebastian and Olivia, and Viola and Orsino. Finally, Viola discovers the trick that has been played on Malvolio, and he's released from confinement.

One other thought. Never played Shakespeare? Not comfortable with versified texts? Verse text is so much easier to learn than ordinary dialogue. Don't fight or fear the rhythm – it is a friend and the two of you will get on just fine.

CHARACTERS - all ages are relative	
ORSINO	Madly in love with Olivia – head in the clouds – wears his heart on his sleeve but not particularly proactive, which is why he sends Viola (as Cesario) to do his wooing for him.
VIOLA	Young and very attractive, but vulnerable and with a strong sense of duty, even to the extent of it being to her own personal disadvantage. In love with Orsino, but – masquerading as a man – cannot reveal it.
SEBASTIAN	Olivia's twin brother. Believes his sister to have died in the shipwreck they both experiences. He is in a land where he is a stranger and needs to choose his friends carefully.
OLIVIER	A Countess – in extended mourning for, first her father then her brother. Keeps rejecting Orsino's advances and, upon meeting Viola for the first time, but thinking her to be a man, falls in love with her/him. Is used to commanding and being obeyed.
MARIA	Olivia's maid – and possibly once her nurse. Middle-aged. Very savvy and possesses a wicked sense of practical joke humour. Does not suffer fools gladly and has no respect for her supposed superior in the Olivia household – Malvolio. A born schemer with a sharp tongue when required. Keeps Belch and Aguecheek in check.
SIR TOBY BELCH	An older relative of Olivia – middle-aged and sporting a drink-nurtured paunch. Always on the make and looking for freebies. Holds lesser mortals in contempt and gets up Olivia's nose and fails to see that he is outstaying his welcome.

CHARACTERS - all ages are relative	
SIR ANDREW AGUECHEEK	Cast in a similar mould to that of Belch, but not a contender for Mastermind. His greatest asset – especially in Belch's eyes – is that he is loaded and of a generous nature. The name suggests that he is of spare build in contrast to his fellow conspirator.
MALVOLIO	Possesses an ego that would make Jeremy Clarkson look like a shrinking violet. He lives in a world of his own, decorated by flights of fancy and displays contempt for anyone he sees as being a lesser mortal – i.e. 99.9% of the world's population. His ambitions include the hand of his mistress, the Countess. His vanity makes him easy meat for the conspirators, Maria, Belch and Aguecheek.
FABIAN	A member of the Countess's household who allies himself with Messrs Belch and Aguecheek – for the fun of it.
ANTONIO	A sea-captain who befriends Sebastian and helps the young shipwrecked gentleman, even to his own possible dangerous detriment.
FESTE	Feste is, like the majority of Shakespeare's clowns, a sort of 'Everyman' and commentator. He/she also serves as a kind of catalyst and helps people to see their own failings and weaknesses.

These are the principal roles in terms of size – but NOT importance.

There is a maxim in the theatre that is well worth noting and remembering. There is no such thing as small parts – only small actors. In addition to the scripted cross-dressing I shall also be inviting voluntary cross-dressing to help offset the preponderance of male roles. So – come on ladies – show your mettle! By the same token there will be ample opportunity for actors to display their versatility by taking on more than one role. Numbers are being kept to a practical minimum and the play has been edited down so that an energetic tempo can be maintained. Details of audition pieces will be available nearer the time.
