

written. Featuring performances from some of the Little Theatre's most popular actors and actresses, this promises to be an excellent start to the new season.

The show opens on Friday 29 February and runs through to the following Saturday 8 March, with evening performances from 7.45pm and a matinee on Saturday 1 March at 2.30pm.


