Some of you will have enjoyed the visit of the Players' Collective on December 22, with Jack Shepherd playing Scrooge in A Christmas Carol. This festive production nicely set the scene for a merry Christmas which I hope was celebrated by "every one".

Now we have a varied and entertaining programme lined up for 2013. Rehearsals for *The Titfield* Thunderbolt are well under way and are proving to be great fun. This play is something rather different for Seaford Little Theatre. Many of you will be familiar with the Ealing comedy from which it has been adapted, and it involves quite a complicated set (wonderfully designed by Alan Lade). The workshop team has been busily occupied bringing the railway station, bar and other

places into existence. Characters tend to be larger than life but there are still some poignant moments to be found, and thanks to Margaret Kennedy for agreeing to rise to the directorial challenge! All-in-all a very worthwhile undertaking and I'm sure you will enjoy the result in February.

May will see the staging of a brilliant piece of theatre with an excellent director. Cathryn Parker is to direct *The Cemetery* Club by Ivan Menchell. Please note that auditions for this play will take place on Tuesday January 29th, earlier than usual to allow the cast plenty of time to familiarise themselves with the sparkling dialogue before rehearsals begin immediately after the February production. seaford little theatre presents THE TITFIELD THUNDERBOLT WAS a very popular 1953 film comedy made by Ealing, starring Stanley Holloway, about a group of villagers endeavouring to keep their branch railway line open following threat of closure by British Rail, and competition from dodgy local bus operator, Vernon Crump. In 1997 celebrated playwright, Philip Goulding, took on the considerable challenge of turning that film into a warm, funny and entertaining stage play, which has been successfully touring ever since. Based around the station at Titfield, it features a host of eccentric characters and some marvellous theatrical effects and tricks to transform Seaford Little Theatre into a fully functioning village railway line!

> Respected local actors, Angie James and Mike Piller, make their debuts at Seaford, alongside the more familiar faces of

Roland Boorman, Jenny Humphries, Sue Shephard, Martin Adams and Andrea Lowe and the long overdue reappearances of Phil Armstrong and Lee Powney, last seen here at the end of the 20th century! To cap it all there is also a cameo stage debut for backstage boy David Heathcote. So don't miss the train, book your ticket on the Titfield Thunderbolt, pack your sense of fun and climb aboard for an evening of joy and nostalgia.

The show opens on Friday 15 February 2013 and runs through to the following Saturday 23 February, with evening performances from 7.45pm and a matinee on Saturday 16 February at 2.30pm.




Other meetings will be held on every 1st Wednesday in the month thereafter unless there is a play in production All levels welcomed, from total newbies to experienced knitters.



AUDITION NOTICE - THE CEMETERY CLUB by Ivan Menchell

Audition: Tuesday 29 January 2013 - 7.45pm Seaford Little Theatre Production dates: 10 - 18 May 2013

Director: Cathryn Parker

Don't be put off by the rather funereal title: *The Cemetery Club* is a **poignant and gentle comedy** about the nature of true friendship and love the second time around. Set in Queens, New York, **the comedy is essentially Jewish** and part of the challenge for five talented actors will be to master the cadences of the language and sustain a convincing New York Jewish patter in a manner comprehensible to the Seaford ear!

Ida, Lucille and Doris are three Jewish dowagers coping in very different ways with the middle aged deaths of their comfortably off husbands. They have been friends for over twenty years and each month meet at Ida's home to talk and visit the nearby cemetery to honour their departed spouses. Throughout the play we learn how their various relationships with their husbands colour their adjustment to (merry) widowhood. Ida has immersed herself in her family, Lucille has taken to shopping and dating in a big way, and Doris is content to live for the monthly visits to the cemetery to be with her beloved Abe again. Ida and Lucille have not yet resigned themselves to solitary autumn years, but Ida does not have Lucille's apparent confidence in the singles market.

The balance of their lives is threatened by Ida's burgeoning affection for Sam, an eligible widower, who has a reputation as a womaniser, but who is as uncertain as Ida about trying again. Lucille and Doris take desperate measures to prevent their circle being broken by Sam's presence. The ensuing misunderstandings are both poignant and funny and resolved in a surprisingly bittersweet twist at the end. There is a cameo role for Sam's would be girlfriend, Mildred, in Act II.

This is a comedy which touches hearts and emotions leaving us with a feeling of admiration and affection for these wonderfully warm women. The audience should leave the theatre having laughed a lot and cried a little but definitely the richer for sharing these lives for an evening.

After a get-together read through on **Monday 25th February 2013**, I will start rehearsing the usual Monday and Thursday pattern. We will rehearse on a third day each week either Tuesday evenings or Sunday afternoons. This will be agreed once casting is finalised. We will have to contend with Easter and the Spring Bank Holiday. At the moment I do not plan to rehearse over the Easter fortnight as so many people do go away for Easter, but if we end up with a cast that stays at home we may rehearse on non-Bank Holidays that fortnight. This is a small cast play and rehearsals will invariably involve all characters (except Mildred). In the early phases I can probably be quite flexible so please bring any dates you will be unavailable to rehearse during that period to the audition.

CHARACTER NOTES

According to the script all characters are in their late fifties to early sixties. I think a playing range of mid-fifties to mid sixties is probably about right but the main thing is that the characters make a credible friendship group and be capable of dancing (or learning to dance) a cha cha cha. The following notes give a brief overview of the characters.

IDA

Plays hostess to the cemetery club. Initially Ida appears to be dominated by her livelier and bossier friends, but she has a streak of determination. A loving and kind woman she appears the homeliest of the three. She sees the good in everyone and is the peacekeeper. She feels guilty about her feelings for Sam and she has her heart broken. Happily her strength shines through and her patience is rewarded in the end. A wonderful part with a whole range of emotions to play with.

LUCILLE

Is a feisty, foxy lady. Her memories of her marriage are not happy ones and she has been quick of the mark to launch herself back into the dating field, much to the disgust of Doris and the tacit disapproval of Ida. She is a fun loving girl not ready to grow old. An unrepentant flirt, she even tries picking up Sam at her husband's graveside. She has smouldering sex appeal and is lively and energetic. She has a vicious tongue on occasion but a heart of gold. She too makes a journey through a wide emotional range during the play. She has a wonderful final soliloquy.

DORIS

Is probably the oldest of the three, but we never know for sure as she's sensitive about her age. Although widowed the longest, she is never going to move on to another phase in her life, she is totally faithful, even beyond death, to her beloved Abe. She is the straightest laced and the severest of the three. She has a sense of humour but it is buried under her sense of propriety. She is desperate to preserve the cemetery club and has no qualms in spiking her friend's burgeoning romance to do this.

SAM

Is a dapper, debonair widower with the reputation of being ladies' man. He is charming and diplomatic and for all his winning ways vulnerable and insecure. He is reasonably easily scared off his courtship of Ida by her friends and dabbles with the affections of the hapless Mildred. His innate goodness surfaces by the end of the play. A role demanding sensitivity and strength. This is no "flash Harry".

MILDRED

Only appears in Act II sc I as a decorative adjunct to Sam. A cameo role, but an important one. She realises early on in the scene that the intimacy she believes she has with Sam is a poor shadow of the strength of feeling there is between him and Ida. She is determined not to give him up without a fight however.
